What is the Neocatechumenal Way?

A formation process aimed at rekindling the faith in nominal Catholics

To most it is a mystery. To some it seems like a sect. It is not a movement, like Cursillo or the Charismatic Renewal, but it has the approval of Popes dating back to Pope Paul VI and including, just last month, Pope Francis. One thing is certain: the Neocatechumenal Way definitely moves people to a new life as Christians. It is a series of steps similar to the RCIA, or Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults but lasting much longer — aimed at rekindling the faith in people who have been baptized Catholics.

Miami's new auxiliary, Bishop Peter Baldacchino, is a product of the Neocatechumenate, which his family joined when he was thirteen in his native Malta. He describes the Way as "small communities of rediscovering the faith."

Bishop Baldacchino, a Malta native, is the first bishop in North America to come from a Redemptoris Mater seminary, and only the third such bishop worldwide. One of his classmates, an Italian from Salerno, is vicar general in Estonia. A Redemptoris Mater seminary opened in Miami in December 2011 and currently has 13 seminarians enrolled. One Redemptoris Mater priest already has been ordained for the Archdiocese of Miami, and another will be ordained this May.

Fast facts about the Neocatechumenal Way

- Founders Kiko Argüello, a painter, and Carmen Hernandez, a graduate in chemistry and theology, met in the shanty town of Palomeras Altas, on the outskirts of Madrid, Spain, and developed a program for evangelizing the slum's residents, many of them gypsies, prostitutes, drunkards and robbers who had no relationship with the Church.
- In 1974 the Congregation for Divine Worship, while preparing the reintroduction of the catechumenate for adults (known as RCIA), published a laudatory note, "Praeclarum exemplar," and settled on the name "Neocatechumenate" to indicate an itinerary of postbaptismal formation for those who are baptized but not sufficiently catechized.

- On May 8, 1974 the Neocatechumenal Way was approved by Pope Paul VI during a meeting with Argüello and Hernandez.
- In 1987 Pope John Paul II opened the first Redemptoris Mater seminary in Rome to prepare priests for the New Evangelization; today, there are 100 Redemptoris Mater seminaries worldwide, with almost 2,000 priests already ordained and 2,000 seminarians in formation. Eight of those seminaries are in the United States, including the one in Miami.
- In 1990 the Neocatechumenal Way was recognized by Pope John Paul II as "an itinerary of Catholic formation valid for our society and our time," and an instrument for the New Evangelization.
- On June 13, 2008 five Congregations of the Holy See — Doctrine of the Faith, Divine Worship, Bishops, Catholic Education, and Council of the Laity approved the final statutes of the Neocatechumenal Way
- On January 17, 2011 Pope Benedict XVI approved the "Catechetical Directory of the Neocatechumenal Way."
- Families in mission: Neocatechumenal Way send families to areas on the periphery of
- can contain the spread of Protestant sects until priests can be sent and new parishes founded. Currently, there are about 1,000 families in mission all over the world.
- Missio ad gentes: Groups consisting of a priest and four or five large families who, at the request of a bishop, receive a mandate to evangelize de-Christianized or pagan areas. There are now 95 missio ad gentes in the world, including six in the United States dioceses of Brooklyn, Boston and Philadelphia.
- On February 1, 2014 Pope Francis met with about 12,000 members of the Neocatechumenal Way, A formation process aimed at rekindling the faith in nominal Catholics sent 450 families in mission and established 42 new missio ad gentes.
- Today, there are about 25,000 Neocatechumenal communities in 800 dioceses and 6,000 parishes in 124 nations, including 1,000 communities in 300 parishes and 75 dioceses in the United States.

The Archdiocese of Miami has thirty communities in eight parishes.

Catholic Days at the Capitol March 25- 27, 2014

The day began very early Tuesday morning when fiftyfour members of the Archdiocese of Miami made their way to Tallahassee to participate in Catholic Days at Capitol. Forty-four of those travelling to Tallahassee are members of the Miami Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women.

We arrived in Tallahassee to join delegates from the seven dioceses of the State of Florida. We gathered at the civic center to attend a legislative briefing on the four issues we would discussing with the Legislators followed by a breakout session to prepare further for the meetings at the Capitol scheduled for the following morning.

On Wednesday morning, we made our way to the Capitol for meetings with our assigned Legislators. All delegates gathered again for Diocesan pictures followed by a luncheon with some of the state legislators in attendance and many of the Florida Bishops including our new Auxiliary Bishop, Bishop Peter Baldacchino.

At this luncheon, the Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops awarded Honorable Renee Garcia of Hialeah the Defensor Dignitatis in appreciation for his ongoing effort to protect the human dignity of residents of our state. In addition, the Defensor Vitae Award was given to Honorable Thad Altman from the Orlando Diocese for his ongoing effort in defending the sanctity of life.

Later that evening we headed to fill up all the pews at St. Thomas More Co-Cathedral for The RED MASS. This celebration of the Mass is known as the mass to invoke the Holy Spirit for guidance upon the Executive, Legislative and Judicial Branches of Government in the state of Florida. There were nine Florida Bishops, numerous Priests and Deacons from around the state. The Homilist for the mass was Bishop Robert N. Lynch, from the Diocese of St. Petersburg. That evening over dinner, we talked about the activities of the day and the hope that we truly planted seeds with our Legislators to facilitate a better understanding of the proposed bills to assist them in their decision when the votes are taken.

In conclusion, CDAC is one of those "you just have to be there" types of experiences. Not all of the observations and events can be conveyed in writing.

We are grateful for the financial support we received from some of the Pastors and Parishes of the archdiocese. We know that we are supported by many prayers and the bonus of financial support enables more participants due to the reduced personal cost of the trip.

On a footnote, there was a drawing for a gift certificate to be awarded to any prior attendee who brought their tote bag from last year. Our very own, Margaret Wright won a \$25 gift certificate!

God is Good, All the Time.

Below are the four bills presented this year for at Catholic Days at the Capitol:

UNBORN VICTIMS OF VIOLENCE SUPPORT: SB 162 (Stargel); HB 59 (Ahern)

Bill Provisions:

- Replaces the term "unborn quick child' that is currently used in the vehicular homicide, DUI homicide, and killing of an unborn quick child by injury to the mother, with the term "unborn child"
- Provides for a separate offense if a person commits any crime that causes the death of, or bodily injury to, an unborn child
- The provision cannot be used to prosecute for conduct relating to an abortion the pregnant woman consents to or any medical treatment by for the pregnant woman or unborn child.
- Provides that the death penalty may not be imposed for an offense against an unborn child.

Rationale:

The Florida Unborn Victims of Violence Act creates an added protection for women, particularly pregnant women and unborn children from assault and homicide crimes.

UNANIMOUS JURY RECOMMENDATIONS IN DEATH PENALTY CASES

SUPPORT: SB 334 (Altman); HB 467 (Rodriguez)

Background:

Whether one supports or opposes the death penalty, a unanimous recommendation for a sentence of death ensures a more reliable and fair sentencing process. Delaware and Florida are the only two states that require a simple majority vote of 7-5.

Bill Provisions:

- Requires that an advisory sentence of death be made by a unanimous recommendation of the jury.
- The jury must find each aggravating circumstance used to support the jury's recommendation of death beyond a reasonable doubt and by a unanimous vote.
- A special verdict form must be submitted by the jury confirming unanimity on any and all aggravating circumstances relied on to support the death penalty recommendation.

Rationale:

Florida has reversed 24 death sentences, the highest number of any other state by far, due to innocence. Death and executions are irreversible; therefore, as long as the state of Florida maintains the death penalty, our state has an obligation to respond to these egregious errors by altering our current death penalty process.

VOLUNTARY PREKINDERGARTEN (VPK) EDUCATION PROGRAM

SUPPORT: Bolstering VPK Scholarships through Budget Process

Budget Requests:

- Increase the per-pupil scholarship amounts by at least \$100 per child served
- Offer scholarships for VPK teachers to improve credentials

Rationale:

The VPK program makes it possible for families to have a pure form of school choice (without "means testing" or financial-need requirements) for their children at a crucial and foundational stage for academic development.

KIDCARE EXPANSION FOR LEGAL IMMIGRANT CHILDREN SUPPORT: HB 7 (J. Diaz); SB 282 (Garcia)

Bill Provisions:

This bill allows approximately 26,000 low-income, legally residing immigrant children to participate in the KidCare insurance program affordably, an increase of about 1%. Both bills maintain the exclusion of eligibility for undocumented immigrants of any age.

Rationale:

This promotes healthier children and families in Florida. Low-income legally residing immigrant children are also more likely to receive preventive care and less likely to use hospital emergency rooms.
