The “Hostess” is usually the first person your members or guests meet at the door of your meeting. She is the face of your organization. Is she friendly, knowledgeable about your organization, can she answer any questions *i.e.* what will be happening for the evening or what your group does?

You may want have several Hostess at your meetings especially the first meeting of your Council year. Why? Besides being the faces of your Council, these Hostesses can assist any new members with what may be happening at this meeting. (Call them if you will a members guide). They can also assist with the refreshments.

We want our guests and members to feel like they are visiting old family and friends in our own homes. If we do this everyone will have a happy positive experience. Remember what brought you back to your **second** Council meeting!

Some suggestions to help members and guests feel welcome are:

1. **Arrive early.** There are usually some early guests and members. See that everything is ready before they arrive. Try to arrange for as many as possible to register before the meeting.

2. **Have name tags** so members won't be embarrassed should they forget names. Write or print plainly with a dark marker with letters large enough so the bifocal group can read them easily.

3. Have **hostesses** at the door to greet members and introduce them to others, especially the new members.

4. Have someone at the door to say **“Goodbye”, thank them** for coming and ask them to come again.

She was proud to be able to present over \$200,000 to the winners during the 17 years of her tenure. In 2005, a new “love” entered Lucy’s life much to her surprise. Scarlett Scholarship, a white bear dressed in red feathers and sequins was given to Lucy. Thanks to Lucy’s creative genius, Scarlett became the Scholarship’s singing Mascot (for a donation, of course). Lucy never went anywhere without her Scarlett, and it seemed that at times they were one!

MACCW might have been near and dear to Lucy’s heart, but she was also involved in many other charities and organizations in the Miami area during her lifetime. Legislation

On May 28th, 2014, I attended the Human Trafficking Community Resources Awareness Symposium with President Ann Cubillas and Deanna Evans Cook. There were 107 persons present from the various agencies such as The Department of Homeland Security, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, Attorney General's Office, Federal Law Enforcement Task Force and the Florida Department of Family and Children Services.

This topic ought to concern every person, because Human Trafficking is not only a debasement held in bondage, but also of those of our humanity. It ought to concern every community, because it tears our social fabric. It ought to concern every business, because it distorts markets. It ought to concern every nation, because it endangers public health and fuels violence and organized crime.

Around the world, there's no denying the awful reality. When a man, desperate for work, finds himself in a factory or on a fishing boat or in a field, working, toiling, for little or no pay, and beaten if he tries to escape: when a woman is locked in a sweatshop, or trapped in a home as a domestic servant, alone and abused and incapable of leaving – that is human trafficking.

Michelle Ortiz, Co-Chair of the Miami-Dade County Human Trafficking Coalition and Program Manager, International Rescue Committee stated, "for all the progress that we've made, the bitter truth is that trafficking also goes on right here, in the United States. It's the migrant worker unable to pay off the debt to his trafficker. The man, lured here with the promise of a job has his documents then taken, and is forced to work endless hours in a kitchen. The teenage girl, beaten, is forced to walk the streets. This should not be happening in the United States of America." "We've expanded our interagency task force to include more federal partners, including the FBI. The intelligence community is devoting more resources to identifying trafficking networks. We've strengthened protections so that foreign-born workers know their rights."

Homeland Security Agent Vic Williams stated, "We're going after the traffickers, whether we use either The Mann Act or The RICO Act. New anti-

trafficking teams are dismantling their networks. Last year, we charged a number of these predators with human trafficking. We're putting them where they belong -- behind bars. "But with more than 20 million victims of human trafficking around the world -- think about that, more than 20 million -- they've got a lot more to do." "Of course, no government, no nation, can meet this challenge alone. Everybody has a responsibility. Every nation can take action. Modern anti-trafficking laws must be passed and enforced and justice systems must be strengthened. Victims must be cared for.



So here in the United States, Congress should renew the "Trafficking Victims Protection Act." Whether you are a conservative or a liberal, Democrat or Republican, this is a no-brainer. This is something we should all agree on. We need to get that done. Every faith community can take action as well, by educating their congregations, by joining in coalitions that are bound by a love of God and a concern for the oppressed. And like that Good Samaritan on the road to Jericho, we can't just pass by, indifferent. We've got to be moved by compassion. We've got to bind up the wounds. Let's come together around a simple truth -- we are our brother's keeper and we are our sister's keeper.

And finally, every citizen can take action: by learning more; by going to the website that has been created -- SlaveryFootprint.org; by speaking up and insisting that the clothes we wear, the food we eat, and the products we buy are made free of forced labor; by standing up against the degradation and abuse of women. That's how real change happens -- from the

bottom up. And so my message today, to all is and to the millions around the world – we the Council of Catholic Women see you. We hear you. We insist on your dignity. And we share your belief that if just given the chance, you will forge a life equal to your talents and worthy of your dreams.

The fight against human trafficking is one of the great human rights causes of our time, and the United States hopefully will continue to lead it. The change we seek will not come easy, but we can draw strength from the movements of the past. For we know that every life saved -- in the words of that great Proclamation -- is "an act of justice," worthy of "the considerate judgment of mankind, and the gracious favor of Almighty God."

Mark your calendars for Catholic Days at the Capitol, March 3-4, 2015!

The National Council of Catholic Women is introducing the **Caps of Love Project**. It is a very simple way of recycling all types of plastic bottle caps, with 100% of the profits going to provide wheelchairs and service dogs for handicapped children.

Plastic caps are a different grade of plastic from the bottles and are valuable in bulk. They can be sold to companies using recycled "post-consumer" plastic to create new products such as park benches, plastic paint cans and more. You may be thinking, "what kind of caps?" Everything from beverages, toothpaste, grated cheese, peanut butter, spray paint caps, laundry soap, cleaning products, and the list goes on. All that is necessary is to pull out any paper liners. If the cap has a metal band it is not recyclable, and PLEASE -- no metal caps (such as from beer) or pull-tabs from cans! For more information please visit www.CapsOfLove.com.

The parish affiliate CCWs will collect caps and turn them in to the service commission chair at the deanery or diocesan meetings. Your diocesan commission chair, along with the diocesan president, would be responsible to transport caps (**Labeled, NCCW**) to the collection program in Florida. Some Home Depots have a program (free inter-store delivery) in place that provides free shipping of the caps to the Home Depot store (#6316) in Lantana, FL. Arrangements must be made with the manager of the individual Home Depot. (If someone you know vacations in Florida, send your caps along!)

A flyer is available for you to use when introducing the project to your group. It can be placed in your churches, schools, hair salons, etc. You may want to change the contact name at the very bottom to a local contact name and email address.

October is Respect Life Month. The first Sunday in October is Respect Life Sunday and the life chain will be held on that day from 2-3 pm. Check with your parish for the one nearest you.

NCCW RESPITE PROGRAM

RESPITE trains local volunteers to help family members care for loved-ones at home by offering relief and renewal to the family caregivers. The NCCW program includes a curriculum to train volunteers, materials to promote the program, and a group insurance program for Respite volunteers. The NCCW Respite program, if implemented by the Diocese is regulated by their own safe environmental criteria. The USCCB mandated that each Bishop select which program they would use and more than 80% of all US Dioceses use the program called Protecting God's Children. All volunteers must complete this PGC class, which is a once in a lifetime class, and they must have a current criminal background check on file with their parish or diocesan office. Criminal background checks are good for 5 years and then must be updated if the volunteer is to continue. It is necessary for each diocese to know what is required in their diocese. All volunteers must complete Respite Care basic training and have all safe environment criteria in place before being placed with a client. Since NCCW provides our insurance, we must have all components in line and cannot misrepresent NCCW or any of our dioceses.
