On June 5th we celebrated the Solemnity of Pentecost, a day commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles and Mary the Mother of our Lord fifty days after His resurrection. The Holy Spirit is often referred to as the Forgotten Person of the Trinity, in the Nicene Creed, He is the Lord, the Giver of Life, and at other times He is referred to as the Love between the Father and the Son. As a catechist, my students were often reminded that given the three stages of the Rites of Initiation, they were born into the family of God in the sacrament of Baptism, nourished by the Bread of Life in the sacrament of Holy Eucharist, and empowered to become a disciple of Christ in the sacrament of Confirmation. We are baptized in the name of the Holy Spirit at Baptism and sealed with the Holy Spirit at Confirmation. Upon the completion of our initiation, the power of the Holy Spirit is a constant presence in our lives to assist in our spiritual growth and development.

Mary was overshadowed by the Holy Spirit and gave birth to the Son of God. Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit when she heard the voice of Mary at the time of the Visitation and the baby in her womb leaped for joy. Mary Magdalene and the other ladies found the tomb empty because Jesus had been risen from the dead by the power of the Spirit of God. And on the day of Pentecost, Peter delivered a Spirit-filled message that converted the hearts of three thousand men, not including women and children.

The pandemic has dampened the faith of many; however, it is our prayer that by the power of the Holy Spirit our faith is restored, our hearts enkindled with the fire of God's love, and we are empowered, strengthened, and motivated to fulfill the mission that has been entrusted to us as members of the Council of Catholic Women.

a letter from the MACCW Immediate past president: Marliese Ljuba

After a two year hiatus due to Covid, the Miami Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women held our 62nd convention in Deerfield Beach. We had approximately 125 women attend, including 4 from the newly formed CCW of Diocese of St. Thomas, the US Virgin Islands. The theme of the convention was "Expect great things from God; attempt great things for God". This has been the theme of my presidency, and I hope that it will continue to be a reminder to all of the great things we can expect from our Lord as we continue to serve him.

One of the main highlights from the convention was the Golden Rose Award. MACCW presented the first Golden Rose Award to Grace Chaffins from Our Lady of Lourdes parish. Grace was chosen for her outstanding service, leadership and spirituality. My hope is that this award will bring awareness to the faithful young ladies of our diocese about the Miami Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women. With the award, the young ladies will always remember MACCW and hopefully return one day as an active member.

During the convention five girls were awarded \$5,000 scholarships each to attend a Catholic high school of their choice. To date MACCW has awarded over \$316,000 in scholarships to over 71 recipients.

The ladies of MACCW joined in the Crowning of the Blessed Mother, followed by a Living Rosary led by newly ordained Fr. Enzo Rosario. We had Fr. Ryan Saunders speak about Catholic Days at the Capitol and the importance of our role as Catholic voters. Fr. Matthew Gomez, the archdiocesan vocation director, spoke about the importance of supporting vocations and asked the women to pray for vocations and keep their eyes open for any potential young priests at their parish that may need support.

Archbishop Thomas Wenski celebrated the Saturday vigil Mass with the ladies, including some women of the hotel staff. His message to those present was to be faithful to God and stand up for the Catholic Faith. "Opening our hearts to others and their needs, recognizing Jesus in the person of the prisoner, the migrant, the hungry, is an opportunity for each one of us for salvation and blessedness."

The closing banquet ended with MACCW presenting Archbishop Wenski with a \$3500 donation for the archdiocese's burse fund. Another check for nearly \$7000 from the MACCW proceeds from Hugs for the Homeless was presented to the Archbishop for the Msgr. Bryan O Walsh Children's Village. The Children's Village is a shelter for unaccompanied minors.

The last day of the convention closed with a memorial prayer service for our beloved deceased members of MACCW, followed by the installation of the new MACCW board.

I would like to thank all those who helped and supported me during my term as MACCW President. I wish Karen Lorenzen, the new president of MACCW and the new board continued success. My hope is for the future of MACCW to unite and grow in membership.

Legislation

You will receive your information from three different sources: Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops (FLACCB), United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) and NCCW Legislative Advocacy. If you need to send anything regarding legislation, it must be approved by President Lorenzen and the material must be from these three sources.

Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops - (FLACCB)

The Florida Conference of Catholic Bishops (FLACCB) is an agency of the Catholic Bishops of Florida. It speaks for the Church in matters of public policy and serves as liaison to the executive, legislative and judicial branches of government. The archbishop and bishops of the seven (arch)dioceses in Florida constitute its board of directors.

All the 7 diocese of Florida makes the Province of Miami. The FLACCB serves as liaison to state government on matters of concern to the Catholic Church in the seven dioceses of the Province of Miami, as a nonpartisan public policy voice on behalf of the Catholic Bishops of Florida.

United States Conference of Catholic Bishops - (USCCB)

Our purposes under civil law are:

- to unify, coordinate, encourage, promote and carry on Catholic activities in the United States;
- to organize and conduct religious, charitable and social welfare work at home and abroad;
- to aid in education;
- to care for immigrants;
- and generally to enter into and promote by education, publication and direction the objects of its being.

NEWS:

On April 14, 2022, Governor Ron DeSantis signed into law HB 5 that limits abortions in Florida to the first 15 weeks of

pregnancy. The new law also includes provisions to improve infant health and analyze and reduce fetal and infant mortality.

Religious freedom Week June 22-28

Religious freedom allows the Church, and all religious communities, to live out their faith in public and to serve the good of all. Beginning June 22, the feast of Sts. Thomas More and John Fisher, the USCCB invites Catholics to pray, reflect, and act to promote religious freedom.

We wish to thank all of you for helping to make our 2022 Annual Scholarship Fund Raising Event on February 19, 2022, at the Embassy Suites Hotel in Ft. Lauderdale, a success. Bishop Enrique Delgado started the luncheon off with a prayer. We Honored Oscar Cedeño, Cardinal Gibbons High School Principal, for "Making a Difference in Catholic Education in the Archdiocese of Miami". We were pleased to be able to meet 2 of the 2021 scholarship recipients, Isabella Parra, who is attending Cardinal Gibbons High School, and Aolani Dominguez, who attends St. Thomas Aquinas High School. Alexis Battoo, a 2020 scholarship recipient who attends Cardinal Gibbons High School, thanked us for enabling her to attend her "dream high school". They gave us an update on their experiences in high school. On behalf of the scholarship committee, I would like to thank you for the outpouring of support from the membership. Thanks to our benefactors and all of you, we exceeded our goal this year and raised \$22,833.00.

The scholarship committee met on April 2, 2022, to judge the 39 scholarship applications that were sent in from 14 different schools. Ten of the applications were missing requirements to be eligible and were not judged. We choose 5 girls to receive a scholarship of \$5,000.00 each, to attend

the Catholic high school of their choice. The 5 girls are: from St. Mary Cathedral Catholic School, Yardora Bayard, who will be attending Msgr. Edward Pace High School; from St. Helen Catholic School, Julie Nguyen, who will be attending Cardinal Gibbons High School; from Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Catholic School, Astrid Cadevilla who will be attending Archbishop McCarthy High School: from St. James Catholic School, Rosedele Joseph, who will be attending St. Thomas Aguinas High School: and from Annunciation Catholic School, Amanda Desravines, who will be attending Msgr. Edward Pace High School. The girls will be presented the MACCW Lucy Petrillo Scholarship Award Certificate at the 62nd Annual Convention Luncheon.

We will continue to seek ways to make the MACCW Scholarship Program a financially sustainable and viable enterprise. We are seeking additional sources to help finance the scholarships.
