the Share the Wealth MACCW made...\$215.00 the Raffle Gifts made...\$555.00


I believe the final count was about 150 outfits that were distributed to the districts from

It was a pleasure to attend the MACCW Annual Convention. I received the 2 checks from the FCCW Project, Hugs for the Homeless. The Central District chose to send half to the Missionaries of Charity of Mother Teresa Homeless Shelter, Miami, and half to Camillus House. Miami. I received a call and an email from Christine Perez. VP Camillus House of Development. She thanked us for the donation and also invited us for a tour of the main campus to witness the impact of our support.

Our portion of the clothes from the Doll Campaign went to His House Children's Home, located in Miami Gardens. The organization's founder felt called in 1987 to establish "a place to call home" for children who could safely live with their parents, due to abandonment, abuse, or neglect. His House Children's Home is a private non-profit, faith-based organization dedicated to restoring the lives of children from newborn to 18 years of age. His House has grown through the years from one home to the largest campus in the State of Florida, with a 232-bed capacity.


Central District Mary Weber, Dresident

Designated by the Office of Refuge Resettlement, His House International was established in 2008 to care for Unaccompanied Children under the age of 18 who left their native countries due to homelessness. gang violence. economic hardship, or abuse in the hopes of starting a new life in the U.S. Since its inception, over 6,000 unaccompanied children have called His House their home. The day I dropped off the clothes, they told me they were expecting 3 more children the next day.

### MACCW SPIRITUALTY REPORT JUNE I, 2024

Praised be Jesus Christ, Now and Forever!

Good morning my name is Ana Portela and I am the new Spiritual Chair. I do not have much to report since I just started a few weeks ago, however I would like to share some of our goals for this coming year.

Our first and foremost goal is to grow in our relationship with our Lord Jesus Christ. These are some ideas to encourage you to grow in your faith:

- 1. Spend 5min reading the Bible. Commit to opening your Bible to any page and pick one paragraph, and then spend the rest of the 5min. reflecting on what God is telling you through that passage.
- 2. Pray the Rosary. Some people do this every day but try to do this at least once a week. If you gather with somebody else to pray it is even more fruitful.
- 3. Keep a journal of people that you promise to pray for. There are many of us who tell people we will pray for them but then we forget who they are. Even if we use our phone to keep that list, it is better to have those names in front of you.
- 4. Try Fasting. Not for the purpose of health or weight loss but try fasting with the purpose of a spiritual sacrifice for someone you love.

Our other goal as a Council will be to have a day of Reflection. Every Catholic organization has three aspects: Social, Service, and SPIRITUAL. Sometimes we forget that the Spiritual aspect of our Council is as important as any other business. Hopefully, we will be able to provide Days of Reflection for Advent and Lent.

Finally, we are in the year of the Eucharist. We have not heard a lot about this. In a recent poll the results showed that 70% of Catholics do not believe in the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. This belief is uniquely Catholic. If you truly believe that Jesus is present in the Eucharist, then when we go to Communion understand that you are in front of GOD.

### MACCW family Life Peport

On May 30<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> there were multiple calls to Patrick Madrid on Relevant Radio regarding stay-at-home moms. Relevant Radio found on 1010AM or on your Podcast is an excellent source of information on family life and our Catholic faith.

Abortion continues to be a big issue, especially at this time for the State of Florida. Our current law bans abortion after 6-weeks of pregnancy. However, a baby's heart begins beating on the 4<sup>th</sup> week of gestation.

Amendment 4 is being placed on the ballot this November 2024. The wording on this amendment is very devious and misleading. If passed, this amendment would allow **ANY** healthcare worker to recommend abortion. The state does not define healthcare worker and therefore **ANYONE** working in the healthcare industry from a doctor to a janitor at a healthcare facility can recommend an abortion to a woman. In addition, the state does not define what "viability" means. Therefore, the meaning of a viable pregnancy leaves a lot of room for interpretation and opens the door to killing babies at any gestational age up to and including full term pregnancies. Lastly, parental consent for minors would **NOT** be required. Parents would only be notified

of the abortion, but the abortion CAN be done with or without the parents consent or knowledge.

Be aware that several countries in Europe have banned puberty blocking drugs because there is enough medical evidence, especially those coming from Britain, proving how harmful these drugs can be. Interestingly, the American Academy of Pediatrics in the U.S. has made no comment in response to the call from British pediatricians to stop puberty blockers.

Lastly, if you know of any couples who have been married outside the church, encourage them to speak to their parish priest to see if they are candidates for the convalidation of their marriage. It is a very beautiful if it can happen.
